From the Manse

With Rev. Dr. Jamie Milliken

Dear members and friends of United Irvine, There's an old saying, "What you think, is what you become".

A blind man once asked St Anthony, 'What could be worse than losing your sight?' He replied, 'Losing your vision.'

You might say, "But, I have problems...I'm in debt... I'm lonely, I'm stuck in a rut." But don't let that image define who you are, because if you stay there too long then the image gets stuck and becomes a reality that is difficult to break free from.

Similarly, there's a lot of negativities going around about the Church of Scotland nationally, "We're broke, we've lost our way, we don't have enough ministers, we're not listening to our members". We certainly need to address these issues when they are the reality – but that's not done by simply accepting and passing them on unchallenged, or giving in to them, because then these negativities begin to shape our reality, we lose vision, and our downfall becomes a self-fulfilling prophesy.

In Bible times wine was stored in leather wineskins, but as they aged, they lost their flexibility. New wine always required new wineskins. And just like, 'You can't put new wine into old wineskins' (see Matthew 9:17), so God can't give you a new vision until you change the old images you've got stuck in your head. God says, 'I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?' God is ready to do something new in your life, God's ready to do something new in United Irvine's life.

I'm a member of the Church of Scotland's Seeds for Growth Committee and have the privilege of seeing God at work across Scotland as congregations grasp a new vision and come to our committee to fund doing the new thing (whatever that looks like in their context).

And our own Crossing Together currently has an application in to Seeds for Growth to part fund something called Bubble Church (I'm not allowed to assess my own application!). Bubble Church involves action songs, puppets, storytelling, a simple liturgy, prayers, and creative response activities. It is more intentional faith sharing and worship focused than Messy Church and should complement the great work already going on with Messy Church in United Irvine.

Regardless of whether this application gets the green light, we are trying, and God is moving. God is doing the new thing in and through United Irvine and is ready to do even more. A fresh new movement of God in Dreghorn, Irvine, and Springside. We recognise this and its great potential when we get behind our vision statement.


"In United Irvine Church of Scotland,

What's your immediate thought when you see the United Irvine brand, 'United Irvine Church of Scotland' (UICS), or are invited to a UICS service or activity?

Your first reaction might be anything from a feeling of loss for the way things used to be, through weary indifference, to excitement about what lies ahead... There is a considerable variety & diversity of activity across our respective centres which adds up to a remarkable in-reach & outreach (Youth & Schools' Work, Messy Church, Guilds, Food Bank, Christians Against Poverty, ConneXions' crossroads for caring relationships, Crossing Together's pioneer mission, & the hosting of community groups in our buildings, etc). It will take some time to grow a greater sense of allegiance & belonging to UICS among us, 'Me in your small corner & you in mine'; learning to rejoice in the good happening across our centres & praying, with concern & empathy, for each other. Undoubtedly, it is unfortunate that it is taking so long for Presbytery to survey our buildings (along with Irvine Old Parish's) and decide which to retain & release in the pursuit of Christ's Mission in Dreghorn, Irvine, & Springside. We're in a tough time of transition, but there have been mutually encouraging times when we've worked together (e.g. Shoeboxing, Weekends Away, Joint services, etc). Yes, we face huge challenges like reducing another large deficit budget and wonderful opportunities like our schools' work.

Buildings are important tools for God's work, worship & witness, but God's People are 'Church' & 'churches', not buildings. I was inspired and encouraged to learn the experience of a colleague & friend, Rev. Mike Fuccella, who was a pastor in Thailand. He served the Karen people on the Thai / Burmese border as one of only 4 ordained ministers serving 9 churches in a presbytery stretching through 300km of jungle. The Karen people are unwelcome on both sides of the border and face huge challenges of poverty. On a recent visit, after an absence of 20 years, he was amazed to see that the church has grown from nine to 25 congregations, each with its own ordained minister, and many more house churches are growing.

Mike is now a minister in Biggar, facing the union of 3 congregations. In the last few years of his ministry he hopes to help prepare that union for a similar growth. Here in United Irvine, I believe that, if we can get our eyes onto Jesus, and devote ourselves to the prayerful realising of our mission & vision statements, that, in 20 years (DV), a similar upturn & uplift can be witnessed to God's glory. It will likely look very different to the way we do church today. Like the seeds & bulbs sown in dark soil which rise into beauty & bloom, and Jesus' crucified & buried body which rose with the promise & hope of everlasting life, so also our lives given selflessly in service & sacrifice can give rise to beautiful people, places, actions & activities able to bless & transform lives & communities in Jesus name. Will you join in by giving yourself wholeheartedly to UICS and God's Kingdom purpose & plans, ready to invest your energy, time, talents, & money in a future which you may not see, but which will be seen and appreciated by many in the future?

It is my prayer (perhaps selfish) that I will return here in years to come to see what God has been doing and be as encouraged by what I see as Mike was in Thailand. As Hebrews 12:2-3 puts it,



"Let's fix our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith, who for the joy set before him suffered the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of God's throne. Let's consider him who endured such opposition, so that we'll not grow weary and lose heart."

The surprising holiness of Easter eggs

Everyone knows that Easter egg colouring and the egg hunt are activities tied to the celebration of the Easter story But why?

Where did the tradition actually come from? Is it based on Scripture or is it just a modern-day secular practice that people engage in for the mere fun of it?

Like the Easter Bunny, most of us assume that the eggs, though fun, are steeped in pagan history, not Christian. Lubow Wolynetz, curator of folk art at the Ukrainian Museum in New York City said "In pre-Christian days,



eggs were associated with many different springtime rites". "In Ukraine, for example, where people were an agricultural society. A cold spring had an impact on crops, so people attempted to harness the power of the sun to bring about the resurrection of nature." Early Ukrainians would decorate the outside of eggs and then give them to family members and friends. Later, when Christianity arrived in Ukraine in the 10th century, old and new traditions collided

Eggs were once forbidden foods during Lent (which is why eggy pancakes and paczki are popular Pancake Tuesday treats). But, of course, chickens don't follow the liturgical calendar, so they kept on producing their eggs during Lent. Not wanting to waste food, farmers would hard boil the surplus eggs to keep them from spoiling. Thus, come Easter, many cultures would enjoy boiled-egg dishes and would dye and decorate the extra eggs.

As the significance of Easter eggs grew, each culture put its own "stamp" (sometimes literally) on Easter eggs, creating eggs ranging from the earthy to ornate, on tables in farmhouse to palaces (think Faberge). But a delicious Easter egg was created in France and Germany in the 1800s. Then in 1875, John Cadbury created a chocolate Easter egg with dark chocolate and filled with sugared almonds. The Cadbury Cream Egg as we know it arrived nearly a century later.

Because of their importance as Easter food, the Church even had a special blessing for eggs: "Lord, let the grace of your blessing come upon these eggs, that they be healthful food for your faithful who eat them in thanksgiving for the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you forever and ever."

Britannica notes that the first instance of painted Easter eggs dates back to the 13th century. The tradition in Orthodox and Eastern churches is that early Christians would paint the eggs red to symbolise the blood of Christ that was shed on the Cross. According to Good Housekeeping, early

Christian missionaries dyed the eggs different colours to represent different aspects of the Easter story. Yellow was used to represent the resurrection, blue to represent love and red again was used to represent the blood of Christ.

Easter egg hunts can be traced back to Martin Luther, a key leader in the Protestant reformation. Men would hide eggs for women and children to find. It is believed that the joy the women and children experienced as they found eggs is meant to mimic the joy Mary Magdalene and the Apostles felt when they found Jesus' tomb empty and realised He is risen!

DREGHORN BROWNIES

This session we have been focusing on friendships to help the girls to recognise healthy relationships. This has led to them also looking at kindness and doing good deeds.

We celebrated thinking day by looking at our history we were able to create windows into guiding. We also made predictions for 10 year's time to see if girl guiding would change in that time. Some of the predictions were quite funny and a few girls wanted Brownies to go to space! We also had a huge celebration with almost 400 girls at Greenwood Academy. The girls had a fantastic day and even involved a Taylor Swift tribute!



Over the next few weeks, we are going to have a Brownie traditions night where we will look at all the old-fashioned ways that girls used to get involved in Brownies and also what they had as resources. We're also very excited that Mrs Carey who was a Brownie herself in the 1950s and became an adult leader is going to come along to give the Brownies a talk about what Brownies was like for her and also answer any questions they have. This will be so valuable to the girls!

We also have our trip coming up where we're going Tubing in New Milns. We have been to this trip several times before and it has always been the girl's favourite trip. I would also like to give a mention to three girls

that are going to receive their Gold award which is the highest award you can get in Brownies and we're very proud of them. They are Lucy, Lois and Emma. Well done girls!! Our Division Commissioner is going to come along to present the girls with their award which will make it even more special.

A YEAR IN SCOTLAND



Emma, Madalyn, and Heather, who are all originally from the US, are currently serving as Young Adult Volunteers (YAV) with United Irvine. At the halfway point of their YAV year, they are deeply engaged in the community, while also discerning their next steps in their callings. On International Women's Day they consider the relationship of the Church with women.

If you read the gospels through the lens of "how does Jesus treat marginalised people," you may forget that a massive part of that group is women. Women are not a monolith, and Jesus interacts with women from every walk of life, from wives and mothers to holy women of God to prostitutes to women consumed by demons. This makes it easy to forget that while all of these women are marginalised in different ways, their experiences would have been similar because of their identities as women. While Mary, Jesus' mother, would have had a very different life than the sex worker who anoints Jesus in Luke 7, the world would have seen them both as a threat to the established patriarchal world order by virtue of them simply being women.

The cognitive dissonance between women simultaneously being treated as a universal threat to male superiority and being treated differently based on their station and "place" in life has certainly not gone away. Especially in the church, women are considered "good" if they fill roles such as cook, carer, mother, and wife. If we don't want to fit into those boxes, oftentimes people don't know what to do with us. Fortunately for us, Jesus' specialty is subverting expectations and taking people out of the boxes that society puts us in. Organised religion is a product of humans, and can, at times, separate us from God. Because the church is created by and for humanity, it is subject to the problems of humans, including misogyny. But when we look to Jesus' treatment of women from all walks of life in the Bible, we see women's power and dignity, and it is incredible.

Being a woman in the church means subverting expectations. It means proving that godliness does not solely correlate with masculinity. And it means expanding what femininity actually looks like. I'm very proud to be a woman pursuing a theological education because I know it's not what's expected of me. It is a path that I have been called to and am forging for myself. And that makes me feel empowered. I think everyone deserves to feel empowered in their church community. And I don't believe limiting where women can serve allows for that to happen. The church is more than just a certain group of people, and I believe church leadership should reflect that.

I think being a woman in the church requires taking special care to look out for the people who make you stronger. Some people would prefer women to be soft and nice in a way that allows men to have more power. But the truth, of course, is that women are not a threat to men's power.

Because we all perform at our best when we are challenged by others (iron sharpening iron). Keeping women weak is a way for some men to create their own illusion of being more powerful. But what's even more dangerous is that some women will do the same, believing that it will be easier to go along with the status quo than to challenge it. That's why promoting voices that support women is so important. Otherwise, who will envision that women can be and do more?

If I feel like a man, or anyone, is treating me differently because I am a woman, then I know it's in my best interest to find the people who will uplift me instead. Fortunately, people who support women in the church are not difficult to come across. I think churches have a long way to go in actualising what women in leadership looks like. But most people I come across at least want that to be the reality. Even though men have historically held more religious authority, the church needs to empower women to be at its best. I hope my journey will help to shape that vision in the future.

Originally from New York, I grew up in the state of Maryland just outside of Washington, DC. I recently graduated from University with majors in Religious Studies and Psychology. I was raised in the Presbyterian Church in the USA (PCUSA) and after University, I wanted to get some practical experience. The PCUSA sponsors the Young Adult Volunteer Program which hosts volunteers in a variety of locations for a year of intentional service. I am currently serving my YAV year in Irvine, Scotland.

Growing up, my mother was the senior pastor at the churches I attended. My father was a stay-at-home dad. As a child I did not understand the gender roles my parents were defying by doing what was best for our family. When I was four years old, Jim Forbes, a well-known pastor in our area came to our church as a guest minister. After the service, mom introduced me to Rev. Jim Forbes and instead of saying hello back, I looked up at my mother and said that I didn't know men could be pastors. I had no knowledge of the exclusion women faced from speaking up in church settings, let alone being the person in the pulpit.

When I tell this story to people, many of them laugh in amazement that a child could grow up with this misunderstanding and in joy that the misunderstanding occurred. The idea that women can be pastors is still controversial and thought of as uncommon. The role of Reverend is still seen to be a "man's" job by many. My hope is that one day that people won't laugh in amazement at my story but will be confused that there was ever a time in which women weren't allowed to be pastors.

Emma: I studied Psychology and Religious Studies at the College of Wooster, which has strong Scottish ties. Growing up in Maryland with my Mom as my Pastor. I applied to YAV to experience faith in action in Scotland, take on a leadership role, and discern my vocational future in an intentional Christian community.

Madalyn: I'm from Indiana and graduated from DePauw University. I joined YAV to explore God's call for my life and to experience a different cultural perspective on church, walking with people through their journeys.

Heather: I recently graduated from Davidson College with majors in history and political science. Originally from Indianapolis, I now have roots in North Carolina. I'm interested in the role of the church in social justice, and I'm enjoying witnessing how churches can use their social capital to serve those on society's margins during my YAV year.

held over three 90 minute sessions or can be delivered in a day if that suits better. It is informal and works best in groups of 4 to 12 people. We are keen to visit any local groups to deliver this excellent free training. If you know of a group that would be open to us attending then please get in touch with us.

As you know from our UICS base our CAP area also covers Kilmarnock. At a recent meeting with Lillian Jones MP for Kilmarnock and Loudon she was so impressed by our volunteers that she tabled the following motion at The Houses of Parliament.

That this House commends the outstanding work of Christians Against Poverty (CAP) in providing free, expert debt advice and practical support to individuals and families facing financial hardship; acknowledging the invaluable role played by CAP in helping people escape problem debt, build financial resilience, and restore hope in their lives; recognises the increasing demand for debt advice services amid the high cost of living and economic pressures; expresses concern that many frontline debt advice providers face funding challenges that threaten their ability to support those in need; and calls on the Government to do what they can to help free face-to-face debt advice services to ensure that organisations like Christians Against Poverty can continue their vital work from the excellent Howard Centre in my consistency of Kilmarnock and Loudoun and in communities across the UK.

We remain very grateful to everyone at UICS and beyond who helps us with their prayers, financial contributions and the time they give to support those who are vulnerable in our area. It is humbling to see that our work is being recognised in such a prominent place as The Houses of Parliament. ConneXions has been in operation now for almost a decade, since the grand opening in February 2016, and it is remarkable how many people still come in for events and comment on the friendly welcome they receive, the peaceful atmosphere and how busy the place is. The phrase, 'I never knew all this was here' is still uttered by a new person seemingly every week and many comment that they have

driven past on numerous occasions and always wondered what goes on; they are surprised to find a vast array of groups and events and a whole thriving ecosystem of community activity taking place on a daily basis. Maybe you are one of those people, who reading this is unaware of the café that is open three days a week serving a cornucopia of delicious and nutritious food, drinks and home baking; or the range of social activities that go on here, from yoga and tai-chi classes, to creative arts, baby and children's groups, recovery support and sports.

We are a creative and caring community and whatever your interests or situation you can find a welcome and a space here. Our café, with adjacent children's soft play, is open from 10am til 2pm on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday and is an ideal meeting place for families and friends to get together and/or meet new people. We also run a volunteer project, which is reported-upon elsewhere in this edition and this provides opportunities to get more directly involved in the life of the community.

As a proud member of the Poverty Alliance (povertyalliance.org) we also get involved in poverty-alleviation initiatives both locally and nationally, including taking part in Challenge Poverty Week each October and providing ways to combat food poverty through our café schemes, including Kids Eat Free on Wednesdays and the Warm Welcome initiative in which we provide warm space, food and drink, power for charging devices and a fully stocked community coat bank. We partner with local organisations such as the Fullarton Community Hub and Choice Food Larder, North Ayrshire Council and the North Ayrshire Drug & Alcohol Recovery Service (NADARS) to provide support and compassion for people struggling with the affects of food poverty, isolation and addiction.

The Moderator's Challenge 2024-25 Let Your Little Light Shine Building God's people through education in Malawi

LIGHTING UP LEARNING IN MALAWI

Rev Dr Shaw Paterson, the Moderator of the General Assembly, has issued a challenge with the potential to transform the lives of students in Malawi.

Can you spare some funds to support an appeal that helps children to do their homework and advance their education with the aid of small solar lights they can borrow from a school's 'light library'? The funds will also be used to help PhD students at Zomba Theological University to study during hours of darkness.

Dr Paterson was inspired to launch the appeal after his visit to Malawi last autumn where he saw the challenges children faced in studying during the dark evenings without lights in their homes and when he witnessed first-hand power outages at the university. Run by a local branch of the UK-based charity Solar Aid, the appeal we are supporting is named Let Your Little Light Shine – Building God's People Through Education in Malawi.

But he also noticed that there were barriers for students who were keen to learn. For children, without lights in their homes they could not study after it became dark. And for PhD students at Zomba Theological University they were frequently dealing with power outages, something the Moderator witnessed first-hand. His challenge aims to help students at both ends of the academic spectrum – primary school learners and PhD students.

Let your little light shine - creating light libraries for primary schools

The Moderator saw an initiative at Thondwe CCAP Primary School which he believes the Church could help replicate. He believes 'light libraries' could hold the answer. It is lighting up homes to allow children to do homework by funding a simple 'light library' at their school, allowing them to borrow small solar lights to take home, potentially making a difference to their whole future.

The headteacher at Thondwe told him how the simple solar lights are allowing extra time for children to learn in villages where there is no electricity and so it is dark at 6.30pm. She has seen academic improvement in her pupils since this initiative has been in place. The light also becomes a resource for others in the household too as even one small light radiates a beam which allows others to see also. Before children were studying by using candles or kerosene lamps which are both expensive or indeed not studying at all.

It will also provide solar panels to allow PhD students to study during the hours of darkness. Nestled in the foothills of the majestic Zomba Mountain, Zomba Theological University (ZTU) has high ambitions.



As part of its strategic plan to advance and extend quality theological education, ZTU is embarking upon an ambitious renovation project to provide accommodation for new and expanding postgraduate programmes. The vision is that the new centre will become a hub of collegiality, creativity and collaboration that can generate transforming ideas and transformative leaders. The proposed development includes solar power provision and improved IT infrastructure throughout the renovated buildings to provide a variety of flexible working locations.

To ensure the students can make the most of their time of study, there needs to be a consistent electricity supply for lighting and internet access, something which a state-of-the-art solar energy system will ensure once installed – and it will also be more economical than buying from the grid.

The Moderator's visit to Malawi allowed him to see the steps from Early Childhood Development Programmes to the accredited University programmes of the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP) with whom the Church of Scotland have a long-standing partnership.

Talking after the trip he said: "I evidenced a real desire and enthusiasm for education and was so taken by the steps learners (of all ages) took in their thirst for knowledge. This challenge seemed to me to fit in well with my theme for my Moderatorial year of 'Building Together'. As much as I love a good DIY project, this theme is more about 'Building the People of God', allowing everyone at whatever level they are at, to be encouraged and supported to take the next step on their journey through life."

This appeal will help to keep lights shining and give students opportunity to shine too as they seek to enhance their learning.

VITUMBIKO'S STORY

I am 10 years old and am a pupil at Thondwe Primary School in Zomba in Malawi. Malawi is in sub-Saharan Africa and so is near the equator. This means it gets dark between 6 and 7pm every day of the year. I walk to school and when I get home I help my Mum with the chores — I often go to the well to get water for her.

Sometimes I look after my little brother and sister too and they like to play with me. After our evening meal, it is time for me to do my homework. In the past my parents would try to buy some kerosene or candles so I had light enough to read but these are expensive, and they often can't afford them. Sometimes I would try to read by the light of the cooking fire outside the kitchen.

I want to be a nurse when I grow up but I need to get good grades so that I can go to high school and then to university. That is my dream. I want to work hard so that I can achieve this.



I was so excited when our school got a Light Library – our small solar lights are in the library of books at the school, and we can borrow a light as well as a book. It has been one of my favourite times of the day when I can get both and take them home with me. Once I finish my chores, I sit at the table and do my homework. It is so good to have the brightness of the lamp in our small home – even the small children can keep playing in the shadow of it.

Sometimes my Mum brings out her mending which she can see to do. After my homework, my Dad gathers us all together in the light and takes the family Bible down from the shelf and reads to us. Finally, when I curl up under my blanket, I take my story book from the library and fall asleep reading about adventures....and dream about my future as a nurse.

How can you help?

- Solar lights for light libraries, cost around £10 per light and can be bought locally in Malawi.
- The new PhD Centre needs support to install solar power and a modern IT system which would allow students to study at any time.
- · No matter how little you can raise you will be helping to Build God's people in Malawi
- Be creative in your fundraising let us know what you are doing

The Project will remain live until May 2025.




Actual Announcements from Church Bulletins

Easter is about God's love and should not be 'domesticated,' says Bishop Robert Barron

While modern society and culture has made Easter about bunnies, baskets, eggs, candy and spring flowers, Barron said this actually gets to the heart of what ails us.

"The route to happiness is not filling up the ego ... It's emptying out the ego. It's letting go."

While the colourful decor and festivities are not in themselves wrong, they can camouflage our ultimate longings, he indicated. "Wealth, pleasure, honour and power. Thomas Aquinas says those are the four things we seek in place of God," said Barron.

But, he added, "what the soul is hungry for is God, right? God is love. Therefore, the route to happiness is not filling up the ego with these four things. It's emptying out the ego. It's letting go." Easter is the cornerstone of Christianity. Without the resurrection of Jesus Christ, there is no Christmas, no Pentecost, no saints of the Church ... and certainly no New Testament with its four pillars, the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, all bearing witness to Jesus' life, ministry, death and resurrection. As the Apostle Paul told the Corinthians, "And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith" (I Corinthians 15:14).

"God's love is more powerful than anything that's in the world."

Barron said for that reason, "One of the worst things we can do is domesticate Easter." He cuts away the frivolity surrounding the observance of Easter to help people see it instead through the mindset of first century Palestine — that's in order to realise that this is a monumental event that changed the trajectory of human existence.



God's love created the world — and that same love is re-creating it through Jesus Christ, suggested the bishop during a conversation on "Lighthouse Faith." "What Easter means is someone who is put to death in the most brutal way possible by the powers of the world ... by the powers of hatred and cruelty and violence and oppression," said Barron. "This One who is done to death in the most brutal way — God raised from the dead. That means God's love is more powerful than anything that's in the world." And the power of that love, said Barron, is available to us in ways that it never was prior to 2,000 years ago. God's love created the world — and that same love is re-creating it through Jesus Christ.

"Rediscover the radical reality of Easter."

What he means: Easter is about saying early on Sunday morning, "The Lord is Risen!" and responding, "He has risen indeed!" And because of that, all life is forever changed.

A student of history, Barron compares Easter to a phrase coined by the Enlightenment, "Novus ordo seclorum." It is Latin for "New Order of the Ages." Barron said, "The Novus ordo seclorum happened on this grimy little hill outside Jerusalem, when they put this Young Rabbi to death. But God raised Him from the dead." That, he said, "is the new order of the ages. That's what Easter's about."

UICS Finance Matters

The UICS Annual Accounts for 2024 have been approved, independently examined and submitted to the General Church and Presbytery.

The General Fund, which includes all income and expenditure for the day-to-day running of the UICS, had an income for the year of £319,293 and the expenditure was £371,717. This gives a deficit of £52,424 and when we take into account the £12.8k income from St Andrews bank accounts the true figure is a deficit of £65,000 for the year. This would have been a lot worse had it not been for contributions from ConneXions, Dimwicks, Hall Lets and Church Organisations, especially for Heat & Light.

As it stands, UICS has assets of £1,169,057 with most of this being either designated, restricted or in an endowment, meaning that a surplus of only £94,914 was in the General Fund for day-to-day expenditure. This represents two and a half months of average expenditure.

The Balance Sheet as at the 31st December 2024 is shown on the next page.

Over the year UICS has raised £71,428 for other charities and organisations(see the Collections for Third Parties section) with the Kanyanda Health Project and Christians Against Poverty being the two main beneficiaries.

The summary income and expenditure for departments and organisations of the church is also shown in the section following.

As we complete the first quarter of 2025 we have forecast a deficit for 2025 of approximately £20,000 which is not ideal but pretty realistic. To achieve this we MUST try to increase our giving/income and keep a tight rein on expenditure.

To help increase our income we ask that our members and adherents prayerfully consider the following two actions

- 1) For those who already give regularly and over the past few years have not reviewed the weekly/monthly amount given, please consider the tremendous increase in costs we have all encountered, and perhaps increase your tithe/offering if circumstances allow. By way of example the cost of energy has more than doubled in the past 3 years.
- 2) If you are a tax payer and do not Gift Aid your offerings and donation then we urge you to please sign up for Gift Aid and we can claim £25 from HMRC on every £100 you give. It costs you nothing and all we need is a signed declaration form. The church Finance Team will do the rest.

Both of these actions are excellent examples of good Stewardship!

The donations and fundraising for the Kanyanda Clinic continues to exceed expectations. The **Mardi Gras Family Ceilidh** held on the 1st March raised a total of £2,058.80 and a great night was had by all who attended.

God called Neville home just short of his 100th birthday in what has been a remarkable innings. He started life in Ayr, moved to Irvine in his teens where his dad built the Winlinton Garage. He met wife (of 60 years) Nan playing tennis on the Thornhouse Ave' courts, love at first sight!

A Nobel Explosives office boy, moving into Sales, he was called up to the RAF as a wireless mechanic 1946 – 1948, witness to India's declaration of independence on top of New Delhi's India Gate, wireless controlling the fly-



past and snapping photos which got him on TV's One Show when it celebrated the 70th anniversary of the declaration, once back home with an extensive career with Nobel & ICI.

Devoted Husband, Dad, Grampa, & Great Grampa, Neville was longtime member and elder at Fullarton Parish Church, founding member of The Action Group, which reached out to pensioners in the parish & congregation and got the attention of Life & Work & national news, visiting the special meals with his Scottish Country Dancing troupe, dancing till age 94! Dancing before the Queen at Edinburgh's CW Games, and performing abroad with teams in Israel & North America.

We fondly remember: how Neville always wanted to help address and solve issues & problems, was generous in charitable giving, & loved learning new dances in Spain, where 'Super Abuelo', a special tune & dance, was written for him; how daily Small Talk lunches were a great aid to getting Neville out & about; how Neville had a keen upbeat sense of humour to the end, in hospital asked, "Where's your hand dad?" replying with great comical timing, "At the end of my arm." how Neville had a concerned & caring heart, regularly saying, "What can I do to help?" even when he wasn't really able.

We thank you for this active, sprightly, old fashioned, positive, upbeat, sharp, clever, thoughtful, diplomatic, caring, kind, considerate, godly, generous, charitable, clever, Grateful Gentleman. Amen.



Tribute Prayer of Thanksgiving for Mrs Ann Blower (nee Macaulay), died on 8th November 2024, aged 94. Born in Scotstoun, Glasgow Ann grew up with siblings, a typical Glasgow lass joining in with shenanigans like 'Chap the door & run!' Evacuated to Kinloch Rannoch during the War she followed her mum in service. Studying Chemistry at Glasgow Uni she worked went on to work in Ardeer's ICI where she met husband Fred; married for 34 years they had 2 daughters & a son in Linda (ordained CofS minister), Aileen, & Gordon, 5 grandchildren & 2 great grandchildren.

Ann had an adventurous spirit illustrated by her readiness to wade through Jerusalem's Hezekiah's Tunnel with me & a small group, water up to our oxters; she was a faithful Congregational Board member & elder, with special care for members in Care Homes, a trailblazer as one of Fullarton's first lady elders, a presbytery elder, Action Group Convener and activist between 1978 & 96, also serving on the Fullarton

Centre Café rota with the aid of grandchildren, with her compassion, keen sense of justice and heart for the ignored, underprivileged, & oppressed writing letters to politicians as an advocate & complainer, and supporting organisations like Amnesty International & Bethlehem's 'Al Shorouk School for the blind', attending May Day Rallies & ensuring her family were acquaint with the suffragettes' movement & importance of women's rights, someone who showed her faith to be live and real by what she did.

We fondly remember: how Ann was Christened Annie, but preferred Ann or a formal Mrs Blower.

Lord God we thank for this private, mischievous, disciplined, generous, inconspicuous, determined, resilient, independent, caring, organised, organising, courageous, undemonstrative, old school, daring, faithful, family loving lady. You knew Ann with all her strengths & weaknesses. We let her go into your hands, Amen.

Betty McLeod Tribute This is an extract from Betty's own words which were shared at her funeral service: "Born in Riccarton Christmas Eve 1935 one of 4 children two older brothers John and Jim, and younger sister Agnes. We came to Dreghorn about the beginning of the war, when my Gran was ill, she died, and we stayed on with my granddad.

I started work as a hosiery machinist. I also started going out with Willie in 1951 and we were engaged in 1953 and married in 1955. We came to Dreghorn in 1960. I enjoyed home making and used to sew for myself and other people. I made my own wedding dress then the children's clothes, made soft toys, enjoyed knitting, and crochet. I worked part time in Woolworths and then Greenwood

Academy and Ayrshire Central Hospital. I retired from there.

I became an elder of the church on the 21st of November 2004 and felt humbled and honoured to be asked. Working with other elders and listening to what he said at meetings make me realise, in a broader sense, how we help and support each other always with the Church and God's work in mind and caring for others."

Over COVID Betty increasingly became housebound but continued to enjoy visits from members and friends. She was dearly loved and will be dearly missed.

Tribute to Mrs. Agnes Matthews who was a stalwart member of the former Relief Bourtreehill Parish Church. Attending every week until in recent years due to failing health she was unable to do so.

Agnes was born at Law Farm. One of 11 children. Later her family moved to live at Towerlands Farm in Bourtreehill. Once married she settled in Frew Terrace. However, life does go around in circles and being a member of the old Relief Church in West Road she transferred to the new church in Bourtreehill following the transportation of the old church there in 1976. Our Sunday School met in Towerlands Farm and many a church social event was also held there.

Agnes was a hard working committed member of the congregation serving on both the Congregational Board and the Kirk Session. Relief Kirk Session ordained female elders for the first time back in 1993. Agnes was ordained then. Agnes was frequently in great demand for church social events when she entertained everyone with recitations of poetry. She was a natural storyteller.

Agnes approached all her church endeavours with the same diligence, willingness, vigour, in a straightforward no- nonsense manner but always with a friendly, humorous, and cheery manner and with a glint in her eye. She served the church in many capacities and was an integral member of the Guild. Acting as both its President and Social Secretary. She continued to attend the Guild up until the last year or so when again due to her health she was unable to attend.

Recently, someone has described Agnes to me as spirited reminding me of the time when once more when there were problems with the church roof at Bourtreehill Agnes who would probably be in her late 60s at the time went up onto the roof to inspect it along with others. Nothing fazed Agnes. Agnes was a practical worker who epitomized service within the church.

Agnes also served for years as a member of the Irvine Christian Aid committee. She will be remembered fondly by many as a valuable asset of the Relief Church and its KS. A lady who served her church with an unwavering pragmatic commitment and dedication who was an example for us all to follow.

UICS Kirk Session Tribute to Henry Ivan McQueenie, died on 20th January 2025, aged 77.

Youngest of 14, Ivan grew up in Fullarton's Merryvale, with the dubious benefit of a steady flow of 'hand-me-down' clothes; however he could add to his pocket money by ironing his brothers Saturday Night shirts. Jobs wise he was best known for his fair, but firm, handling of Bill Murray's Taxi business, retiring early due to ill health, and also as a Special Constable.

With beloved wife Cathy, he shared the pride of two sons and delight of 4 grandchildren & 2 great grandchildren. Longtime Fullarton elder & church officer, Ivan was my (Neil's) right hand man for Sunday services, funerals & weddings, an honorary role he fulfilled faithfully with great dignity, respect, & perverse humour, ever trying to wind me (Neil) up about how he was on the verge of chucking it all in & leaving. Along with Cathy he served in Summer Missions, Fullarton's Youth Café & Centre Café, nationally worked with Mission and Discipleship in other congregations, and with 'Reality At Work' supporting disadvantaged kids, evidence of his passion for the least, last & lost.

We fondly remember: how Ivan claimed that his parents ran out of names when they gave him the name Henry Ivan McQueenie, and that when people were looking for someone to blame it was 'H-I-M' HIM! how Ivan could snore for Scotland; how he liked to lounge around casually at home, but also liked his suits & to turn out smart

for church & special occasions; how Ivan was a constant joker & wind-up merchant; how Ivan filled his role as Santa for Owlets' & Sunday School parties with great enthusiasm & didn't need any padding.

Ivan missed Cathy so much: his soul mate, wife of 52 years. He is now free from the frailty & frustration of ill-health and at home with God, Cathy & loved ones in Christ.

Lord God, thank you for this cheeky, canny, sarcastic, soft-hearted, determined, independent, straight talking, faithful, loyal, family loving, gentleman. You knew Ivan, all his strengths & weaknesses. We commend him to you and thank you for his years of dedicated service for your cause! Grant Ivan's family & friends, all who grieve and mourn today, your comfort and strength. Amen.



KANYANDA UPDATE

There has been relatively little construction work on site since the last report, because, after a few false starts, the rains came and the villagers have been busy in the fields, with some of the crops shown in the photograph above. The land purchases for the staff accommodation are now completed, and the weather is now more conducive to digging and pouring foundations. Robert and the villagers are moving bricks from the kiln to the building site. In the meantime, further work has been done fitting out the clinic building.

This is a really difficult time for the nation and people of Malawi. These are the hungry months between the sowing and the harvest, when the rural people live on what they have stored. Unfortunately, the harvests have been poor for the last three years, and very little maize or cassava is stored, and people are suffering. To compound the problem, inflation is out of control at an estimated 31% per year, which is disastrous to the rural population who have not grown enough to meet their own needs, let alone sell produce at a profit.
